




EDITORIAL

Welcome to all our new trainers. Lovely to see you there with your puppies and new dogs and also the returnees. You will get a lot from your instructors and if you put just a little time in each day you will reap the rewards. Our puppy class is very full this term to accommodate people so that they didn't miss out so please be patient if it isn't your turn. You need to ... have a handful, as once you have given that 1 piece, there is nothing there to reward the next really good behaviour that may happen within seconds. Tuggy toys are also beneficial ' as the dog is getting the reward from you and with you. Positive reinforcement is the best way to train as many people who have been around for years will tell you. So much better _ than the old days when the poor dogs got their . heads vanked off with slip chains which did so much damage to them. So pleased all this has changed.

Flygility Report

Vet Report – Nicky Chadwick (Animal Care 2002 Ltd)

Diabetes Mellitus in the dog

Overview

Diabetes mellitus is a condition where there is lack of production of insulin (type 1) or an inadequate response of the cells to insulin (type 2). Insulin is a hormone that is manufactured by the pancreas in response to glucose in the blood stream. When we eat food, it is digested and broken down into smaller components - one of these being glucose. Insulin is required by the cells in our body to enable them to use the glucose in our blood stream as an energy source. If the cells cannot use the glucose, then the glucose builds up in the blood stream (hyperglycaemia) and the cells become starved of an energy source. This can affect many organs in the body and if left untreated may lead to ketoacidosis. This is a condition where the body starts to break down fat as an alternative energy source leading to the production of a toxic by-product called ketones. This is a lifethreatening condition and left if untreated will ultimately lead to death.

Which dogs are likely to be affected?

Dogs generally get Type 1 diabetes - or lack of production of insulin. This is often due to destruction of the pancreas by their own immune system or damage to the pancreas inflammatory condition called from an pancreatitis. Entire bitches can also get a condition called gestational diabetes, which is due to the production of progesterone which can interfere with the action of insulin on the cells. Older dogs, obese dogs, female dogs and certain breeds of dogs, that have a genetic predisposition can be more prone (e.g. Keeshond, Australian terrier, Samoyed, Poodle). However, any age, breed or sex may be affected.

What clinical signs can be seen?

Diabetes may have a slow onset and initial signs may be hard to notice.

Symptoms you may see are as follows:

- Increased drinking
- Increased urinating as excessive glucose in the blood spills over to the urine and draws water with it
- An initial increase in appetite as your dog cannot use glucose for energy, so he/she feels hungry all the time as the body craves a food source
- Weight loss
- Lethargy
- Urinary tract infections as glucose in the urine is a good medium for bacteria to grow in
- Cataracts diabetic cataracts form very rapidly within a few days and are irreversible
- Vomiting/collapse if excessive amounts of ketones are produced from fat breakdown

How is diabetes diagnosed?

Your vet may have a suspicision that your dog has diabetes if he/she presents with the above symptoms. Diabetes is relatively easy to diagnose by a blood and urine test which both show a high level of glucose and possibly the presence of ketones. Your vet may also look for the presence of other diseases that can interfere with the action of insulin e.g. Cushing's syndrome or pancreatitis which can lead to damage of the beta cells in the pancreas that produce insulin.

How do we treat Diabetes?

The majority of dogs will require daily insulin injections to allow their body to use glucose for energy. The initial treatment however, will depend on how severe your dog's symptoms are, and if they have any complicating

Unwell dogs with high levels of diseases. ketones in their body (ketoacidosis) will require hospitalisation for treatment to initially stabilise them as this can be a life threatening condition. It may be that complicating diseases will also need specific treatment. Entire bitches should be spayed as progesterone produced by the reproductive tract inhibits the action of insulin and can make it hard to treat diabetes properly. In my experience most owners are initially horrified at the thought of injecting their beloved pet twice daily with insulin. However, the needle is very small and most dogs hardly notice the injection and owners quickly become pretty adept at injecting. Your dog will need regular monitoring to ensure the correct amount of insulin is given. This may involve either serial blood tests to monitor the glucose levels in the blood stream during the day after an insulin injection, or a single blood test called a fructosamine test. Some owners can also monitor their dogs blood glucose or urine glucose at home. Your dog will also need a

fairly strict diet – preferably high fibre food as this only releases glucose slowly and they will need regular feeding times to coincide with insulin injections. It can be difficult at first to find the correct doses of insulin that your dog will need, and these can also change over time.

Owners also need to be prepared to be fairly vigilant in watching out for clinical signs relating to hypoglycaemia (low blood sugar). This is a life-threatening condition that can cause coma and death. This can happen if the insulin level is too high, your dog isn't eating or they have done too much exercise.

Prognosis

Managing diabetes in dogs requires both financial and personal commitment especially in the early period to determine the correct amount of insulin needed to be given. However, most dogs with treatment can live a long and healthy life making this commitment well worthwhile.

Always pick up after your dogs and don't forget to take it away with you we don't have a bin service!


We are lucky to have this area to exercise our dogs please respect it.
